GLYCOLIC ACID OCTYL ETHER, ETHOXYLATED	The chemical was of very low oral toxicity in rats (LD50 > 5000 mg/kg). An analogue chemical was a slight skin irritant and a severe eye irritant. This chemical is, however, a sodium salt of a similar acid, and the acid form would be expected to have different irritation potential due to the low pH of the material. The MSDS for the chemical indicates that the pH of a 100 g/L solution of the notified chemical is in the range 1.5 ? 3. A lower pH again would be expected for the 86 % pure product The NOHSC Approved Criteria for Classifying Hazardous Substances (Approved Criteria) (NOHSC, 1999) states that a chemical should be classified as corrosive if it has a demonstrated pH of less than 2, and that acidic reserves should also be taken into account. Based on the analogue results, the long term systemic toxicity of the notified chemical is expected to be low. An analogue of this chemical was found to not be genotoxic in a bacterial point mutation test NICNAS Full Public report November 2000 No significant acute toxicological data identified in literature search. For acid mists, aerosols, vapours Test results suggest that eukaryotic cells are susceptible to genetic damage when the pH falls to about 6.5. Cells from the respiratory tract have not been examined in this respect. Mucous secretion may protect the cells of the airway from direct exposure to inhaled acidic mists (which also protects the stomach lining from the hydrochloric acid secreted there). Polyethers (such as ethoxylated surfactants and polyethylene glycols) are highly susceptible to being oxidized in the air. They then form complex mixtures of oxidation products. Animal testing reveals that whole the pure, non-oxidised surfactant is non-sensitizing, many of the oxidation products are sensitisers. The oxidization products also cause irritation. Asthma-like symptoms may continue for months or even years after exposure to the material ends. This may be due to a non-allergic condition known as reactive airways dysfunction syndrome (RADS) which can occur
